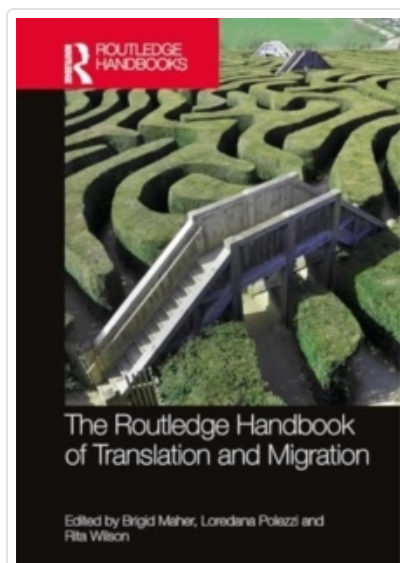


The Routledge Handbook of Translation and Migration
