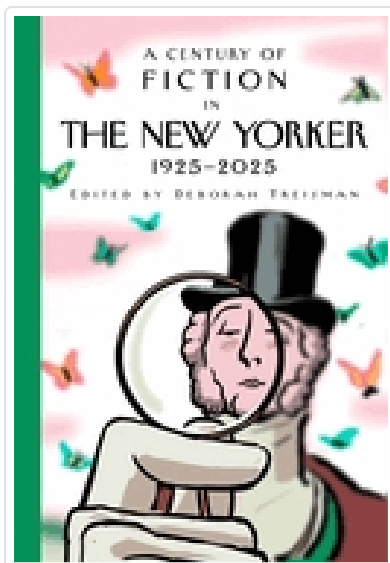


# A Century of Fiction in the New Yorker: 1925-2025
